Berry Snow Director: Institute for Coastal and Marine Research



Since first contact in 2017, the CMR has forged a strong relationship with the University of Oldenburg in Germany, and particularly with members from the Helmholtz Institute for Functional Marine Biodiversity. A CMR delegation of nine members had the opportunity to visit the University of Oldenburg in June to participate in a symposium and workshop, as detailed in the CMR's previous newsletter. In November, it was the University of Oldenburg's turn to send a delegation to the Nelson Mandela University. The CMR's research group for this collaboration hosted ten academics and two postgraduate students from 11-14 November. The programme for their visit was extremely full and busy, with day one consisting of an afternoon meeting to catch up on the progress of developing an exchange programme, as well as further discussions around a number of co-authored publications. Day two gave our German guests the chance to sightsee and visit a few of the local environmental attractions. The Schoenmakerskop stromatolites, Sardinia Bay, the Swartkops estuary and the Sundays River beach were visited. The CMR's research symposium took place on day 3, and three German delegates presented key talks. The last day was set aside for final discussions. This has been a very successful collaboration to date, with one high-profile article under development that will be published in an international academic journal. We look forward to future exchanges, and seeing how this collaboration grows.



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


Discovering Diversity Symposium

This year, the CMR decided to celebrate **Diversity** at it's annual research symposium. It took place on 13 November at the North Campus Conference Centre, and we are thrilled that the venue was filled to capacity from beginning to end. The Faculty of engineering displayed drones used for marine research for guests to look at during comfort breaks, and a cheese-and-wine function followed the day's programme to conclude the CMR's events for 2019. This was the last CMR event that Professor Andrew Leitch (DVC: Research, Innovation and Internationalisation) would attend in his capacity as the DVC: RII and as the Chair for the CMR's Advisory Board, and we were thankful that he was able to join us for the last session.

A total of 18 speakers delivered presentations, of which four were international guests. This event consisted of four sessions:




Professor Andrea Hurst and her SARChI Identities and Social Cohesion in Africa hosted a series of Sea-to-Source Pilgrimages during 2019. The CMR's Dr Berny Snow and Ms Danai Tembo were invited to participate in the pilgrimage that took place from 21-23 June. This project promotes transdisciplinary, co-operative engagement and creativity in order to understand and find creative ways to address social and environmental problems and challenges. Emphasis is placed on connections between ecological and social problems. To celebrate this unique project, the Chair hosted a series of events from 20-21 November. The first was a colloquium for presentations, and the second was for reading poetry and narratives. An art exhibition for this event ran from 19-25 November.





The Algoa Bay Project invited stakeholders to attend the Community of Practice Phase 1 feedback meeting on 25 November. Scientists, researchers and stakeholders involved in the project were given the opportunity to provide feedback on Phase 1 developments and progress. The stakeholders payed an important role in assisting with the identification of gaps in Phase 1, and how the process for Phase 2 can be improved.



HIGHLIGHTS AND FINDINGS OF COP PHASE I

<u>Community of Practice in Marine Science</u> Phase 1 * 2017- 2018

Aim: The CoP aims to develop a local-scale marine spatial plan for Algoa Bay, as proof of concept, that will inform the development of marine area plans for the rest of South Africa and African region, and will aid development of the Marine Spatial Planning Act (2018).

The CoP provides strong support for the Operation Phakisa narrative to grow the oceans economy in a *sustainable* and *inclusive* manner.

MAPRI Celebrations

The Marine Apex Predator Research Unit (MAPRU), a research Unit under the CMR, enjoyed another very successful year. Close to 30 academic articles were published in high quality, internationally recoginsed journals. Two in particular are worthy of special mention:

- Dr Malcolm Smale, a Research Associate and key research team member for MAPRU, was a co-author on a Nature publication: Global spatial risk assessment of sharks under the footprint of fisheries.
- Although unrelated to marine apex predator research, Dr Maëlle Connan, a Research Fellow with the CMR and MAPRU, was a co-author on the article Rapid increase in Asian bottles in the South Atlantic Ocean indicates major debris inputs from ships, as published in Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences 116(42): 20892-20897. This is significant, and contributes to the growing plastics research expertise under the CMR.





Towards the end of October, a female Southern Elephant seal, named Zelda, visited the Cape Recife area and gave birth to a pup named Ziggy. Both were monitored closely by Dr Greg Hofmeyr from Bayworld and his team of assistants, as well as volunteers from SANCCOB. After Ziggy weaned, Zelda returned to the sub-Antarctic and Ziggy was relocated to Bayworld, to be released offshore as soon as he was fit and big enough to survive in the wild. MAPRU students Jonathan Botha, Tegan Carpenter-Kling and Grace Botha assisted with the transfer to Bayworld.









