#### MEIS

In a collaboration with the CSIR (specifically Dr Lara van Niekerk and Professor Susan Taljaard), the Shallow Water Ecosystems Research Chair (under leadership by Professor Janine Adams), hosted a Monday Estuary Interactive Information Session (MEIS) via Zoom. This took place each Monday at 12:00, starting on 24 August and coming to an end on 16 November.

Various CMR members and collaborating researchers presented talks focusing on various aspects of estuarine research ranging between 15-20 minutes, and facilitated discussions thereafter. The presentations replaced the 2020 Management of Estuaries short learning programme, and will be used as online content for this course and student training in the future. #### **Estuary Water Quality Improvement Workshop**

The Water Research Commission (WRC) and collaborators (including the Shallow Water Ecosystems Research Chair/CMR, SAEON, CSIR, DSI, and Zwartkops Conservancy) hosted an online workshop for Innovative Approaches for Estuarine Water Quality Improvement. During this workshop, experts presented on different water quality improvement approaches, including: restoration; biomimicry; sustainable urban retainage systems; algal ponds; governance; monitoring; and improvements of catchment inputs. The Swartkops Estuary was used as a specific study site. This workshop provided input to the development of a socio-ecological systems approach for estuary restoration, which aligns with the UN Decade of Ecosystem Restoration (2021-2023).

#### **UN Presentation**

Dr Bernadette Snow presented a talk at a UN – One Ocean Hub seminar around Small scale fisheries and Blue Justice: Procedural and substantive rights of fisherfolk. This took place on 10 November. Dr Snow's presentation detailed procedural rights in the context of small-scale fisheries in South Africa, with indications of how procedural injustice affects small-scale fisherfolk by increasing inequalities in access to resources, information and markets, as well as gender, class and race power imbalances.


Upcoming Event

#### **Climate Change Webinar**

As part of the Science Forum 2020, the DSI and European embassies (France, UK, Italy, Finland, Germany, Ireland, Sweden, Switzerland), will host an online webinar on 10 December from 11:45-13:15 around climate change. This webinar will form part of the 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of the Paris Agreement. It will focus on the process made since the COP21 in Paris to achieve targets for carbon neutrality and global warming, and the role science plays in achieving the objectives and targets. It will also address relations between research and political decision making and how science will feed into the Youth4Climate: Driving Ambition in Milan and the COP26 in Glasgow.

Dr Moncef Meddeb, Science and Technology Attaché from the French Embassy in South Africa, invited Dr Bernadette Snow to participate in this webinar as a panelist and showcase evidence around climate change research: impacts of climate change and global warming on the environment, biodiversity, and local communities, and focusing on marine sciences and oceans. Dr Snow received contributions from Dr Gavin Rishworth and Professor Thomas Bornman for her presentation.

#### **Impact Ratings**

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor Research, Innovation and Internationalisation called for the University to apply for Times Higher Education Impact Ratings. The CMR Office was requested to report against certain criteria for 2019 activities in relation to various Sustainable Development Goals. The CMR Office could report against SDG14 Life Below Water and SDG17 Partnerships. The CMR's submission was met favourably.

#### Sustainable Ocean Mining Project

The CMR Office is pleased to announce that its proposal to the Council for Geoscience (CGS) and Department for Mineral Resources and Energy (DMRE) for a project on **offshore and coastal mining**, was successful. CMR researchers Dr Bernadette Snow, Professor Rose Boswell and Dr Denning Metuge will lead this research. The inception meeting took place on 3 November.

#### **Aquaculture Research**

The CMR has formed a strong collaboration with the University of Gothenburg's Centre for Sea and Society (Sweden) around aquaculture and food security research. SASUF and the Erasmus Mundus + Exchange Programme (which ran until July 2019) played a significant role in establishing these relationships.

Dr Bernadette Snow worked with the University of Gothenburg's Professor Mats Lindegarth to develop a proposal for a writing workshop for Promoting participatory development of sustainable aquaculture using extractive species in rural areas: Learning from case-studies from four continents and different socio-economic settings. This proposal was successful.

COVID-19 and unrelated family complications resulted in this workshop being postponed. The CMR wishes Professor Susanne Lindegarth and her family all the best with her recovery.



The CMR Office is pleased to announce that all projects are progressing well with remote/working-from-home conditions remaining in place.



Professor Mike Roberts, holder for the UK-SA Bilateral Research Chair in Ocean Science and Marine Food Security (funded by the NRF & UK Newton Fund), was awarded a 2020 Newton Prize. The Newton Prize recognises excellence in science, research, and innovation in support of economic development and social welfare in Newton Fund International research partner countries. For 2020, these countries included Egypt, Jordan, Kenya, South Africa, and Turkey. Professor Roberts was one of five shortlisted candidates for South Africa. One Newton Prize was awarded to each of the 2020 partner countries, to the value of up to £200 000.
