CMR Past Events

Heritage Month Seminars

September was celebrated as Heritage Month, and the CMR hosted three talks by Professor Rose Boswell in celebration of this occasion. All three of these talks considered different aspects of South African Cultural Heritage and links to the Ocean.

- Legislating Marine Intangible Cultural Heritage in South Africa: The presentation proposed that the National Heritage Resources Act 25 of 1999 insufficiently provides for the recognition and protection of marine intangible cultural heritage (MICH) in South Africa. This seminar took place on 1 September and was attended by 20 individuals.
- Observing and Changing the Social Life of Plastics: The presentation focused on plastics and sociality in Gqeberha a city of the Eastern Cape province in South Africa. This seminar took place on 8 September and was attended by 18 individuals.
- Salted Identity: Coastal Personhood and the Re-Humanising of Ocean Conservation: The presentation considered personhood in a coastal community, its influence on identity and the effect of personhood on trauma in the context of ocean conservation. This seminar took place on 15 September and was attended by 25 individuals.

CMR Past Events

Quarter 3 Seminar

The CMR's Quarter 3 Seminar was presented by Dr Jean Harris, the director of WILDOCEANS, the marine programme of the WILDTRUST. Her talk was entitled *The Research Cruises of RV Angra Pequena in the Western Indian Ocean in Support of Marine Protected Area Expansion*. It elaborated on research conducted under the ACEP Programme and conservation research on board the Research Vessel Angra Pequena. Over the last 7 years, the classic research vessel RV Angra Pequena has been used for offshore research cruises along the east coast of South Africa, and up into Mozambique, Tanzania and Comoros. She has been the platform for some of the first mesophotic surveys (40-250m) in South Africa and in the WIO region. The team have also found and filmed coelacanths in sub-marine canyons on three cruises to the iSimangaliso MPA. She is also the ocean home for the Ocean Stewards initiative, providing opportunity for young marine scientists to go to sea and to engage directly with scientists. This event took place on 6 October via Zoom and was attended by 31 individuals.

2021 CMR Research Symposium

The 2021 CMR Research Symposium showcased the five Ocean Sciences-linked and CMR-supported Research Chairs:

- Law of the Sea and Development in Africa Professor Patrick Vrancken: The presentation provided a brief overview of the work of the Chair, focusing on the Ocean Accounts Framework Community of Practice, the publication project on "The Law of the Sea: Contemporary Norms and Practice in Africa" and his work on state ocean jurisdiction.
- Marine Spatial Planning Professor Mandy Lombard: The presentation focused on an ecosystem-based approach to MSP. To further an integrated ocean management agenda, the research programme of the Chair builds on the premise that healthy ecosystems underpin healthy societies and adopts and ecosystembased approach to MSP.
- Ocean Cultures and Heritage Professor Rose Boswell: The presentation focused on Risking Danger for Culture: Fieldwork for Ocean Sustainability during Covid-19.
- Ocean Science and Marine Food Security Professor Mike Roberts: The presentation provided an overview of the impacts of climate change and a changing ocean on marine upwelling systems in the western Indian Ocean.
- Shallow Water Ecosystems Professor Janine Adams: The presentation focused on the team's research on blue carbon ecosystems and response to climate change, mangrove and salt marsh ecology, and water quality management of estuaries.

Introductory Course in Marine Protected Area Management Short Learning Programme

In collaboration with the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) and using funds provided by the Benguela Current Convention (BCC), the CMR hosted and provided accreditation for two courses under this SLP. Three experts presented these courses, namely Dr Peter Fielding, Mr Lawrence Sisitka and Mr Mongezi Nqoro. The two courses took place from 4-8 October (29 individuals in attendance) and 15-19 November (31 individuals in attendance). Delegates represented the following organisations: SANParks, DFFE, BCC, Eastern Cape Parks & Tourism Agency (ECPTA), Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality (NMBM), Ezemvelo KZN Wildlife, Ministry of Fisheries and Marine Resources (MFMR), WildOceans, Khoisan Fishing, CapeNature, Namibia and Angola Government and MSA.

Ceremonial Signing

Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality Cllr Jonathan Lawack (on behalf of the Executive Mayor Bhanga) and Dr Thandi Mgwebi, Nelson Mandela University Deputy Vice-Chancellor: Research, Innovation and Internationalisation signed a Memorandum of Understanding that formalises collaboration between the two institutions. The signing took place on 23 September at the Ocean Sciences Campus.

The following projects use Algoa Bay as the case study area, and forms the basis for the agreement: Algoa Bay Community of Practise, CICLICO (Cities and Climate Change in Coastal Western Indian Ocean), MARISCO (Marine Research and Innovation for a Sustainable Management of Coasts and Oceans), Ocean Accounts Framework Community of Practice and OOH (One Ocean Hub).

The Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality is a key stakeholder in all these projects, as solutions to problems are being developed to assist with being at the forefront of integrative ocean management. In realising the objectives of the various projects, the NMBM working together with the Nelson Mandela University, will be the first to have a draft marine spatial plan in the country. The One Ocean Hub hosted the Ocean and Climate Change: Building Adaption, Mitigation and Resilience webinar which took place on 27 September. The event aimed to explore the impacts of climate change and strategies to build adaptation and mitigation processes. It also showcased the One Ocean Hub research on climate change impacts and building adaptation and resilience that is built on existing networks in some of their focus countries. CMR Adjunct Professor Bernadette Snow gave a talk which focused on Building Coastal Resilience: The Case Study of Algoa Bay, South Africa.

The Conservation Symposium



Her team, many of which are CMR members presented on 12 multidisciplinary research projects that support a conservation and EBM approach to MSP.

SAEON Webinar

CMR Research Associate Dr Lucienne Human and CMR members Dr Paula Pattrick (Post-Doctoral Research Fellow) and Mrs Ross-Lynne Gibb (Doctoral Candidate) presented on Oceans and People: Effects of anthropogenic activities on marine biodiversity during a webinar hosted by the SAEON Elwandle Coastal Node. This took place on 4 August, via Zoom.

SAIAB Seminar

CMR Research Associate Professor Rosemary Dorrington presented on Harnessing the metabolic potential of indigenous marine biodiversity – a multidisciplinary drug discovery pipeline during a seminar hosted by SAIAB on 4 November 2021.







CMR Research Associate **Dr Tegan Carpenter-Kling** (BirdLife South Africa) gave a talk on *Living, working and walking on Marion Island: a birder's perspective* at a webinar hosted by BirdLife South Africa on 16 November.

COP26

At COP26, the One Ocean Hub hosted 13 hybrid events together with various partners. CMR Adjunct Professor Bernadette Snow participated in a roundtable discussion on The ocean and climate justice: impact, adaptation and mitigation on 5 November 2021. She also chaired two events, Climate-related conflict: arts-based mediation and recourse to redress and Children and Young people's human rights to a healthy ocean: their importance for climate change adaptation & mitigation, and was on the panel for one event, SBSTA ocean and climate change dialogue theme: Strengthening cooperation and collaboration among relevant un bodies in tackling ocean and climate change.







The French Embassy visited the Ocean Sciences Campus on 15 September. In attendance were French delegates Mr Moncef Meddeb, Mr Jean-Pascal Torréton, Ms Bertille Dara and Mr Paul Cavalier. On behalf of the Nelson Mandela University, Dr Thandi Mgwebi, Professor Heather Nel, Dr Ossie Franks, Dr Beata Mtyingizana, Professor Lorien Pichegru and Professor Denver Webb, attended. During this visit, topics discussed included advancing sustainability science at Nelson Mandela University, Ocean Sciences Strategy, latest developments at CMR, as well as a presentation from the French delegates.

On 27 September, a high-profile hybrid meeting took place on North Campus to present the regional project initiated by Dr Olivier Bousquet: Ecological Connectivity and Oceanography in the Indian Ocean. Remarks were given by Prof. Sibongile Muthwa, Nelson Mandela University VC, His Excellency Oscar Mabuyane, Premier of the Eastern Cape, and His Excellency Mr Aurelien Lechevallier, Ambassador of France. Scientists from the CMR, including Professors Lombard and Roberts, presented on the science of the project, together with collaborators from UCT, SAEON, the Instituto Nacional de Investigacao in Mozambique, the IRD, and the University of La Reunion in France. Many institutions were represented in person or online, such as the DSI, the NRF, WIOMSA, the AFD or scientists from Madagascar, Seychelles or the Comoros. The meeting was chaired by the DVC: RII and Mr Moncef Meddeb, the Attache for Science and Technology at the Embassy.

Upcoming CMR Events

One Ocean Hub Workshop

The CMR will be hosting a workshop for Ghanaian One Ocean Hub project collaborators around marine spatial planning early next year. This workshop will focus on learning from the Algoa Bay Community of Practice project and other Algoa Bay Project collaborations. The workshop will reiterate the importance of a framework for MSP, and why this needs to be a continuous process centred around stakeholder engagement and evidence-based research. This workshop will be led by CMR researchers Professor Mandy Lombard, Professor Bernadette Snow, Professor Rosie Dorrington, and Mrs Hannah Truter. A number of CMR research members will contribute towards this workshop and deliver expert presentations. Consultants will provide basic training. An important output planned from this workshop, is a handbook for spatial management planning development and enforcement.


