CMR Past Events

CMR Quarter 2 Seminar

The CMR's Quarter 2 Seminar was presented by CMR Research Associate, Dr Christo Rautenbach, on the topic Modelling of low-and high-frequency sea level variability and their drivers around the southern African coast. Dr Christo Rautenbach presented on how his study addressed knowledge gaps in southern Africa ocean dynamics, particularly continental shelf areas and reported on results of a methodical exploration of water level and wave dynamics in these waters. This event took place on 6 June via Zoom (34 people) and in-person (11 people in attendance). Seminar by Dr David Kaplan

The topic of the seminar was Reducing plastic waste and other negative environmental impacts from drifting fish aggregating devices (dFADs) used by tropical tuna purse seine fisheries. Dr Kaplan reviewed work that he, colleagues and collaborators have been doing to find viable solutions to reducing marine debris. This event took place on 18 August via Zoom (26 people) and in-person (7 people in attendance). One Ocean Hub's Blue Heritage Event

CMR Research Chair, Professor Rose Boswell, was a panelist for the One Ocean Hub's Blue Heritage Event for the UN World Ocean Week and discussed Blue Heritage: The Role of Ocean Art and Culture in Ocean Science and Management. This webinar took place on 7 June.



Attaining a Resilient World Event

CMR Adjunct Professor Bernadette Snow was a speaker at the Attaining a Resilient World Event, Session 6: Harnessing nature for transformative adaptation in Africa. Her talk was entitled How best can the gaps between research and practice for NbS be bridged to facilitate transformative adaptation and resilience in Africa? She discussed to what extent are the limits to NbS and cost-benefit analyses known and what potential do they have to inform the integration of NbS into planning and implementation? This event took place in person (Radisson Blu Hotel, Gqeberha) and online on 31 August.

Know Your Bay Talk

CMR postdoctoral research fellows Dr Nina Rivers and Dr Anne Lemahieu gave a presentation entitled: *Marine Spatial Planning (MSP) in South Africa: What, Why, Who* and *How* and *The Algoa Bay Marine Spatial Planning Project: Who, What and How,* respectively, at Bayworld Museum on 24 August. In Dr Rivers talk, she covered the What and Why: broad overview of what MSP is and use to SA; the Who: is leading it at national level and stakeholders; and the How: update on the national process so far and link to AB Project. In Dr Lemahieu's talk, she focussed on Algoa Bay in particular, presenting a map of all the human uses of the Bay, the economic value of ecological services of the Bay and how Bay residents can get involved.




SAEON Webinar

CMR research associate, Dr Shirley Parker-Nance, gave a presentation entitled: *BELTER the way forward: a new LTER platform to inform on benthic change* at a webinar hosted by SAEON Elwandle Node on 3 June.

SAMSS

Many CMR members (including staff, RA's, associate members and support staff) presented at this years SAMMS symposium. This included CMR's acting director, CMR's deputy directors and 3 of the 5 research chairs. Professor Pierre Pistorius presented a Plenary session entitled Seabirds and marine mammals as sentinels of global change. The symposium, which took place in June, aimed to explore the links, continuity and changes in marine science of the past and present.



National Science Week Mini Symposium

In August, CMR research associates, Dr Shaun Deyzel, Dr Shirley Parker Nance and Prof Nikki James, as well as CMR student member, Phumlile Cotiyane-Pondo and CMR associate Dr Carla Edworthy, gave a talk entitled: What's going on in Algoa Bay? at the National Science Week Mini Symposium.

Resilience Cruise

Marine Mammal Team

The team included Dr Gwenith Penry and Professor Amanda Lombard from the CMR. Naked eye and binocular scans were alternated and once a marine mammal was sighted a GPS position, with associated data, was taken. Attempts were made photograph the animals. A total of 33 marine mammal sightings, comprising 9 different species, were made. The team conducted observations between sunrise and sunset and on-effort observations totaled over 260 hours. The sightings will be overlayed with environmental data collected by the oceanographic teams and contribute to further understanding the importance of ocean fronts to marine megafauna.

Bird & Litter Team

The team, with Professors Peter Ryan and Lorien Pichegru, assessed the abundance and distribution of floating debris, flying fish, seabirds and other marine predators. The survey occurred a few weeks after devastating floods in KwaZulu-Natal. Over 7000 litter items were counted during 186 hours of atsea transects, almost all of which were plastic. In addition, some 2000 seabirds (25 species), 3400 flying fish, 600 flying squids, 500 seaweeds and 1400 items of terrestrial vegetation were counted.

CMR World Oceans Day

To celebrate World Oceans Day on 8 June, the CMR hosted a photo competition with the theme Ocean Connections. Individuals were encouraged to submit their best photographs that showcase what connects them to the ocean. Seventeen individuals submitted a total of 43 entries.

Research Chairs' Update



Professor Rose Boswell

In June, Professor Boswell attended a conference, Seas and Oceans' Health and their role on the Present and Future of Humanity, at the Casina Pio IV, in Vatican City, Italy. Professor Boswell presented on Scientific perspective and future scenarios for a sustainable coexistence between Humanity and Oceans. She is in the process of signing MOUs with the University of Nairobi; University of Namibia and Eduardo Mondlane University. Professor Boswell launched the Palgrave Handbook of Blue Heritage and the poetry book, Between Worlds at the UN Ocean Week. Professor Boswell has been in the field, Northern Cape and West Coast from March to April, Eastern Cape from April to June and Lamu Kenya in June. Since the beginning of this year, Professor Boswell has published 4 articles, with 4 in press.



Research Chairs' Update

Professor Janine Adams

Professor Adams and Dr Gavin Rishworth met up with Professor Carlos Manuel Burelo Ramos and his team for a Mexican mangrove and tufa research trip. Professor Adams and Dr Lucienne Human attended the Meerwissen Codesign workshop - building equal partnerships for marine science that matters. Professor Adams and Professor Susan Taljaard attended the Southern African Society of Aquatic Scientist (SASAqS) 2022 congress in the Amanzi Private Game Reserve, Free State. She delivered a keynote address titled Source to sea: estuaries at the interface. **Professor** pressure Adams joined the EPStromNET team on a field work trip to Ireland. They were treated to grey impressive **SSLIME** and skies deposits during their sampling. The Shallow Water Ecosystems research team attended the 17th South African Marine Science Symposium in Durban and presented in total 25 oral and poster presentations.










Congratulations
